Introduction to A 90-Day Investment in the Lives of 3000 People

You are about to embark on an adventure with God. What will this adventure look like?

It could mean that you will pray, fast, and seek God's face and that He will lead you to people that need to know Him, people who need to be baptized, people who need to be disciplined. It may mean that at the end of these 90 days, you will have drawn closer to God through the spiritual disciplines of prayer, fasting, and the giving of your time and energy. It may mean that there will be more people in heaven someday because you took the challenge to ask God for 3000 souls that will follow Christ.

Matthew 28: 18-20

Jesus, undeterred, went right ahead and gave his charge: "God authorized and commanded me to commission you: Go out and train everyone you meet, far and near, in this way of life, marking them by baptism in the threefold name: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Then instruct them in the practice of all I have commanded you. I'll be with you as you do this, day after day after day, right up to the end of the age."

The Message

Jesus said, go and make disciples and that is just what we intend to do. In order to find them, we have to go. And in order to disciple them, we have to introduce them to Jesus Christ.

We are extending this challenge to you. Seek God in prayer and fasting in some form or fashion for 40 days, from February 23rd to April 3rd, 2010. Ask God to lead us, empower us, and embolden us as witnesses that we might see 3000 people come for baptism on Pentecost Sunday 2010, May 23rd.

Use this devotional guide to lead your prayers over the next 40 days; after this 40-day period of prayer and fasting, prepare to spend 50 intentional days seeking those who need to know Jesus the Christ.

In answer to the question you may have about why 3000, I offer the following letter written by Harry Denman in 1949.

Dear Friend:

This letter is to ask every pastor not to observe Pentecost on June 5, but to meet the conditions so that every church will have a Pentecost on that day. It can be done if we will organize our church to witness to the fact that Jesus is Christ and that he is alive and can save persons from sin and death.

EASTER, We celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and Redeemer. We have a living Christ. This is the beginning of evangelism. Why shouldn't every church organize visitation teams to visit one night each week during this period and secure thousands of first commitments for Christ and his church, to be received on Pentecost Sunday, June 5?

FAMILY WEEK. May 1-8, This is a splendid time to visit young families and secure their first commitment for Christ and his church and establish a Christian home. What holy days there are, Easter to Pentecost, Including Family Week!

There were One-hundred-twenty in the Upper Room. They were all filled with the Holy Ghost. Three thousand were baptized that first Pentecost. How many will be baptized in our churches on Pentecost Sunday 1949?

Let us pray and work daily that every church will have a Pentecost.

Shepherds, May 1949

In memory of Evangelist Harry Denman, the Witness Team is presenting a challenge to all United Methodist Churches in the Holston Conference.

Easter Sunday is March 23, 2008, and Pentecost Sunday is May 11. There are 50 days between Easter and Pentecost. We are presenting the challenge to each church to organize visitation teams to visit in your community, engage people on facebook, in e-mails, to come up with your own unique ways to invite people to Christ, to church, during these 50 days.

In his book *The Unchurched Next Door*, Thom Rainer and his group conducted a scientific survey and found the following results:

- 82 percent of the unchurched are at least "somewhat likely" to attend church if they are invited.
- Eight out of 10 unchurched persons said they would come to church if they were invited.
- Only 21 percent of active churchgoers invite anyone to church in the course of a year.
- Only 2 percent of church members invite an unchurched person to church.
- Very few of the unchurched have had someone share with them how to become a Christian.
- The unchurched would like to develop a real and sincere relationship with a Christian.

“For years I have been asked how churches can grow. I have consulted with hundreds of church leaders across America, leaders who sincerely desire that their churches reach people. ‘Why aren’t we reaching people?’ I am often asked. ‘Why is our society so resistant to the gospel?’ many inquire.

“After nearly a decade of research and almost fifteen years of consulting with churches, I am becoming more and more convinced that the answers to most of these questions can be found in the mirror. Nearly 130 million people in the United States alone would come to church if they were invited. And if they came, many would hear about the Savior who offers the only way of salvation.”

Day 1- February 23, 2010

“The desert mothers and fathers of the third century tell a story about paying attention. A novice asked the teacher, ‘Holy One, is there anything I can do to make myself closer to God?’ The elder replied, ‘As little as you can do to make the sun rise in the morning.’ The novice responded, ‘Then of what use are these spiritual disciplines of prayer?’ The teacher answered, ‘To make sure that you are awake when the sun rises.’” (Oden, 2008)

Spiritual disciplines such as prayer and fasting keep us awake.

In Matthew 6:5 Jesus says, “When you pray.”

In Matthew 6:16 Jesus says “When you fast.”

Actually earlier in Matthew 6, Jesus says “When you give.” Jesus was teaching concerning some very important spiritual disciplines in the life of the Christian. Giving, praying, and fasting.

In Jesus’ teaching, He uses the introductory word “when” as if He assumed that we as Christ followers would practice these disciplines. Jesus didn’t say *if* we give, pray, and fast, but *when*.

Take the time today to read Matthew Chapter 6 in its entirety. Pray and ask God how He would have you to seek Him in these 90 Days of Investing in the lives of 3000 people.

One of the comments that I often hear when I talk about fasting is this, “The bible says that we are to fast in secret,” and that is correct, sort of. The bible says that when you give, don’t do it with a parade to announce to people that you are giving and how much. The bible says that when you pray not to pray loudly so that others can hear how spiritual you are and don’t repeat phrases over and over again thinking that because of the repetition, you will get what you want. Then the bible says, when you fast comb your hair and wash your face so as not to show the world how wonderful you are for going without food.

In all of this, Jesus is not saying that we cannot receive an offering in church, Jesus is not saying that we cannot pray in a church service, and Jesus is not saying that when you fast it has to be done in secret with no one knowing what you are doing.

No, Jesus is saying that when you do these things, do them unto the Lord. Do them because you love Him and because you are practicing a spiritual discipline that will help you to be awake when the sun rises.

Prayer

Lord, help me to understand your words in Matthew Chapter 6 today. Help me to draw closer to you through these next 40 days. Give me understanding and revelation and guide me to someone today who needs to know You. Amen

After graduating from college in 1986 with a B.A. in English, I began doing volunteer work for a Kindergarten class near my home A few days before I was to start work, I went in and met the students and talked to them about my wheelchair. None of the students had any questions, and they were all very accepting of me right away.

Then, a few weeks later, I was helping an adorable blonde-haired boy named Anthony. All of a sudden he put down his pencil, looked up at me with his big blue eyes, and said, “Miss Betsy, just why are you in that wheelchair, anyway?” I explained to him that when I was born, there was something wrong with my back, and because of that, I wasn't able to walk. He looked at me very seriously and asked, “Did God make you like that?” I replied, "Yes, He did, Anthony.” Anthony exclaimed, “Well, He made you wrong, didn't He?” Then he picked up his pencil and went back to work, as if that settled everything.

Anthony is now a college student. What I hope he has come to learn over the years is that God is perfect, and everything He has created is perfect. I can't tell you why I was born with a birth defect. But God's Word says that I was created in His image. I sometimes get frustrated because I don't have perfect health. And, of course I'd like to have the body of a super-model. Wouldn't we all? But I know that God has a plan for my life. He has given me unique talents and abilities. No matter what my limitations are, if I put my trust in Him and allow Him to have control over my life, He can use me to do His work

Prayer: Dear Father, thank you for creating us! We know that you have a plan for all of us. Please use our lives in service for you. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

Day 4 - February 26, 2010

Harry Denman would agree with Dwight L. Moody, who told one of his critics, “I like the way I am doing evangelism better than the way you are not doing it!” (*Prophetic Evangelist: The Living Legacy of Harry Denman*, 1993) Howard W. Ellis

Harry Denman was a man who blazed a trail for Christ. He spent a lifetime telling others about Jesus. Today he sits among that great cloud of witnesses in Hebrews 12 - cheering us on! I imagine he is telling us to quit sitting on our hands, to move our feet, to keep our eyes on the prize, and to run the race with perseverance. Harry never lost sight of his goal, and we are to study how he ran the race. He never stopped. He never gave up. He responded to God’s call on his life, and he spent his life sharing the love of Christ with everyone he met. Winning souls for Christ requires ACTION, and we must be a VERB for Christ. We become that VERB when we practice prayer, fasting, serving, seeking, and winning souls for Christ. We cannot do any of this without prayer first and foremost and like Epaphras in verses 5-8, Harry was one reliable worker for Christ and so are you!

Colossians 1: 3-12 (*The MESSAGE*)

³⁻⁵Our prayers for you are always spilling over into thanksgivings. We can’t quit thanking God our Father and Jesus our Messiah for you! We keep getting reports on your steady faith in Christ, our Jesus, and the love you continuously extend to all Christians. The lines of purpose in your lives never grow slack, tightly tied as they are to your future in heaven, kept taut by hope.

⁵⁻⁸The Message is as true among you today as when you first heard it. It doesn’t diminish or weaken over time. It’s the same all over the world. The Message bears fruit and gets larger and stronger, just as it has in you. From the very first day you heard and recognized the truth of what God is doing, you’ve been hungry for more. It’s as vigorous in you now as when you learned it from our friend and close associate Epaphras. He is one reliable worker for Christ! I could always depend on him. He’s the one who told us how thoroughly love had been worked into your lives by the Spirit.

⁹⁻¹²Be assured that from the first day we heard of you, we haven’t stopped praying for you, asking God to give you wise minds and spirits attuned to his will, and so acquire a thorough understanding of the ways in which God works. We pray that you’ll live well for the Master, making him proud of you as you work hard in his orchard. As you learn more and more how God works, you will learn how to do your work. We pray that you’ll have the strength to stick it out over the long haul—not the grim strength of gritting your teeth but the glory-strength God gives. It is strength that endures the unendurable and spills over into joy, thanking the Father who makes us strong enough to take part in everything bright and beautiful that he has for us.

¹³⁻¹⁴God rescued us from dead-end alleys and dark dungeons. He’s set us up in the kingdom of the Son he loves so much, the Son who got us out of the pit we were in, got rid of the sins we were doomed to keep repeating.

May your prayers today be spilling over with thanksgiving! We are no longer in the pit and our sins are gone! Now we must carry out that promise to others and continually throw out the lifeline of hope. May the strength of the Lord fill you as you put your prayers into action just as that great cloud of witnesses did who went before us. May your heart overflow with the joy that comes in knowing Christ Jesus as your Lord and Savior.

Day 5 - February 27, 2010

“I remember Harry Denman as always warm, open, friendly. He had a view of evangelism that was anything but narrow. While he subscribed to most of the traditional methods of evangelism – including revivals and personal witness – he was open to many other methods, some new and experimental.” (*Prophetic Evangelist: The Living Legacy of Harry Denman*, 1993)

New and Experimental Ways of Evangelism

I work with a group of teens today who have challenged every concept I have ever had concerning evangelism. They certainly want to hear about Jesus Christ, and they even desire to be part of the church of today. However, they do things differently than most in the church world have ever done them.

When it comes to communication, they do it differently. They don't talk on the phone so much anymore; they text message each other, even if they are sitting in the same room, often sitting on the same piece of furniture. I have even found myself texting with them while in the same room. It offers a degree of privacy while staying in the group.

Facebook and Myspace are two of the communication tools of choice with the teens of today and, by the way, the generation of people 50 years old and above are also coming to use these tools in huge numbers.

E-mail is passé with the youth of today; they just don't use it. Communication with the youth of today needs to be in short bites, a text message; in video format, such as Youtube; in music they can download from the web, such as itunes; in becoming their friend on sites such as Facebook, Twitter, and Myspace.

It is time that we as the church embrace the methods necessary to communicate the gospel to the youth of today, without changing the message in any way. Take the time over the next days and weeks to get to know the youth around you, in your community, in your own church, through the media of social networking sites. You may just find they are open and receptive to coming to visit your church and, better yet, they will come to know Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.

Jesus taught people in many different places at different times. He taught in the synagogues, out in the open, while moving along the shore in a boat. Jesus never changed the message but he took the message to where the people were.

Luke 5: 1-3 (NLT)

One day as Jesus was preaching on the shore of the Sea of Galilee, great crowds pressed in on him to listen to the word of God.² He noticed two empty boats at the water's edge, for the fishermen had left them and were washing their nets.³ Stepping into one of the boats, Jesus asked Simon, its owner, to push it out into the water. So he sat in the boat and taught the crowds from there.

Lord, like Jesus, John Wesley, and Harry Denman before us, let's take the gospel to where the people are. Amen.

Matthew 13:44 (NIV)

“The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field. When a man found it, he hid it again, and then in his joy went and sold all he had and bought that field.”

A first-century Hebrew man walks alone on a hot afternoon, staff in hand. His shoulders are stooped, sandals covered with dirt, tunic stained with sweat. But he doesn't stop to rest. He has pressing business in the city. He veers off the road into a field, seeking a shortcut. The owner won't mind – travelers are permitted this courtesy. The field is uneven. To keep his balance he thrusts his staff into the dirt.

Thunk. The staff strikes something hard. He stops, wipes his brow, and pokes again. Thunk. Something's under there, and it's not a rock.

The weary traveler tells himself that he can't afford to linger. But his curiosity won't let him go. He jabs the ground. Something reflects a sliver of sunlight. He drops to his knees and starts digging. Five minutes later, he's uncovered it – a case fringed in gold. By the looks of it, it's been there for decades. Heart racing, he pries off the rusty lock and opens the lid. Gold coins! Jewelry! Precious stones of every color! A treasure more valuable than anything he has ever imagined. Hands shaking, the traveler inspects the coins, issued in Rome over seventy years ago. Some wealthy man must have buried the case and died suddenly, the secret of the treasure's location dying with him. There is no homestead nearby. Surely the current landowner has no clue that the treasure's here. The traveler closes the lid, buries the chest, and marks the spot. He turns around, heading home – only now he's not plodding. He's skipping like a little boy, smiling broadly.

What a find! Unbelievable! I've got to have that treasure! But I can't just take it – that would be stealing. Whoever owns the field owns what's in it. But how can I afford to buy it? I'll sell my farm...and crops...all my tools...my prize oxen. Yes, if I sell everything, that should be enough!

From the moment of his discovery, the traveler's life changes. The treasure captures his imagination, becomes the stuff of his dreams. It's his reference point, his new center of gravity. The traveler takes every new step with this treasure in mind. He experiences a radical paradigm shift. (Author Unknown)

Day 8 – March 02, 2010

Make the most of every opportunity. Is God calling you to a deeper life of prayer?

Romans 12:5

In Christ we who are many form one body, and each member belongs to all the others.

As we participate in the 50 Golden Days of Evangelism, we emphasize the need of prayer for individuals and for the church as a whole. In so doing, my mind takes me back to an illustration that Henry Blackaby shares in the Bible study *Experiencing God, Knowing and Doing the Will of God*. On the topic of “God’s Will and the Church,” Blackaby speaks of how God uniquely equips the church so that body functions effectively as a whole. Henry Blackaby speaks of a woman in one of the former pastorates as a knee of the church body, meaning that Ivah Bates was an effective prayer warrior. Interestingly enough, it took a while for Ivah Bates to realize how God had gifted her for the body. She had tried hospital visitation, but Henry Blackaby discovered that those she visited were usually a bit depressed or downcast after her visits. Visiting with her a few times, it became obvious to Pastor Blackaby what the problem was: Ms. Bates always seemed to relate to the patient some terrible outcome of someone she knew who had had the same symptoms as the patient. Try as they did to work with Ivah and teach her better visitation conversation, she never became an effective visitor. However, the church was able to help Ivah Bates identify and utilize the gift that God had given her, and that gift was her prayer life. The church recognized the effectiveness of Ivah Bates’ prayer life.

So it became the practice of those in the church to bring to Ms. Bates any of their concerns. Even the high school and college students would bring to Ivah the names of those that they would be sharing faith with and at what times they expecting to be doing so. Here is one of those examples.

So a student named Wayne said to Ivah, “Next Tuesday I will be witnessing to Doug, would you pray for me?” Ivah agreed. She dropped everything and began to pray over the noon hour while Wayne was witnessing. She did that every time the students told her what they were doing. Only the “hand” was touching the campus, but the whole body was fitly joined together. Each part functioned where God put it, so that the hand could be effective.

About three months later, a young man came down the aisle during the invitation. He was trusting the Lord. I said to the congregation, “This is Doug. He has just become a Christian.” I looked over at Ivah and she was deeply moved and weeping. She had never met Doug, but she had prayed for him for three months.

Who won Doug to the Lord? The body did! (page 162)

During our 50 Golden Days of Evangelism, we must be a people of ardent prayer. Undoubtedly there are certain people among us who are especially gifted in this area of prayer as is illustrated in Ivah Bates’ life. Could you be such a person? Is God calling you to a deeper life of prayer? We are reminded, “*The effectual fervent prayer of the righteous man availeth much.*” *James 5:16b*

Day 9 – March 03, 2010

Only One Message

“When all is said and done, Harry Denman really was a man with only one message, and that was the validity and vitality of evangelism as the sharing of the good news of the new life in Jesus Christ and a call to all persons to follow Christ as Lord and Savior.” (*Prophetic Evangelist: The Living Legacy of Harry Denman*, 1993) Robert F. Matthew 9:37-38 (The Message)

³⁵⁻³⁸Then Jesus made a circuit of all the towns and villages. He taught in their meeting places, reported kingdom news, and healed their diseased bodies, healed their bruised and hurt lives. When he looked out over the crowds, his heart broke. So confused and aimless they were, like sheep with no shepherd. “What a huge harvest!” he said to his disciples. **“How few workers! On your knees and pray for harvest hands!”**

This passage of scripture reminds me of the message that our Bishops, pastors, and lay leaders send out every day. They spend countless hours teaching, preaching, visiting, and praying for people, just as Jesus did. Today’s world is not much different than then - the world is still bruised and hurt, aimless, confused, and lost. The workers truly are few, and many more workers are needed to gather in the harvest, the harvest of the lost.

As a church member, God has broken my heart over and over again for His people. He has awakened me in the middle of the night to pray for our church leaders and for the lost. This came from the heart and not from the mind.”

Wesley said, **“I submitted to be more vile,”** he preached Christ to people wherever he found them. As he wrote many times, **“I gave them Christ, I gave them Christ.”**

Spiritual Power

“I pray for those who labor for God. The Methodist Church needs preachers, missionaries, other full-time workers. God will call them if I ask. But most of all - more than financial, numerical, and organizational influence – my church needs spiritual power. I pray for this.” (*Prophetic Evangelist: The Living Legacy of Harry Denman*, 1993)

Acts 1:⁷ *He (Jesus) said to them: “It is not for you to know the times or dates the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.”*

Jesus calls His disciples then and now to the first priority – being witnesses to Him from our homes and to the very ends of the earth. These were the last words Jesus spoke to the disciples. This final meeting between Christ and the disciples on the Mount of Olives provided a bridge between Jesus’ earthly ministry and what He would do through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. He had told the disciples to wait in Jerusalem until they received power. The forty days of resurrection appearances were over, and here Jesus is reinforcing the Great Commission and the power to carry it out. This is a personal power that comes to us as a gift from God to carry out His purposes for our lives. It is a power to convict, convert, regenerate, comfort and keep. The nature of this power is seen in the word “dunamin” which supplies the root of English words like dynamic, dynamism, dynamo, and dynamite.

Have you felt that you lacked the knowledge of Scripture to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ to the people with whom you come in contact? Do you feel that you may be ridiculed or discounted if you were to speak of the saving faith that can only be found in Christ? Jesus calls each of us to carry out the Great Commission. Trust Him and never doubt the power of the Holy Spirit. It is this same power that raised Jesus to life in the tomb. It is the same power that turned a fearful group of disciples into men who would radically turn the world upside down. This is the spiritual power of Christ in each of us. It transformed the first disciples and has been empowering men and women to take the gospel of Christ to the lost and hurting for over 2000 years. Let us go forth and speak boldly, empowered by the Holy Spirit, of the greatest news ever given to humanity!

Prayer: Thank You, Father, for the gift of the Holy Spirit. May we be obedient to fulfill the Great Commission and allow the power of the Holy Spirit, His wonder-working power, to penetrate through our fear so we can be mighty witnesses for You. Amen.

For it is written: ‘Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only.’” ¹¹Then the devil left him, and angels came and attended him.

- **Jesus fasts 40 days as a human, just like you and me.**
- **It is apparent that fasting gave Jesus spiritual strength to battle Satan.**
- **We are made up of Spirit, soul, and body, yet we tend to place importance on taking care of the body, the soul, and then the Spirit. We have these things out of order.**

Why Fast?

Because we long for Christ to be formed in us, we make this covenant to tend the fires of our souls so that our longing for Christ may never be extinguished and that our lives will be set ablaze with his love.

Lord, as Jesus fasted and prayed, we fast and pray. In these 40 days, we are asking for the miracle Spiritual birth of 3000 people. Lord, hear our prayers.

Of course not.³⁵ But someday the groom will be taken away from them, and then they will fast.”

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, Americans are getting “...taller, bigger, and fatter.” [From an article by Robert Longley, About.com] All we have to do is open our eyes to recognize the truth in that statement. What were Christ’s witnesses to do? You “shall be witnesses unto me” he told them (Acts 1:8). We do not witness to a church or a Sunday school class or a youth group or a program or a new world order. We witness to a person.

A Few Notes on Prayer

Matthew 6:7-15 (NIV) ⁷And when you pray, do not keep on babbling like pagans, for they think they will be heard because of their many words. ⁸Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him. ⁹”This, then, is how you should pray: ‘Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, ¹⁰your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. ¹¹Give us today our daily bread. ¹²Forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. ¹³And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one.’ ¹⁴For if you forgive men when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. ¹⁵But if you do not forgive men their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins.

Jesus taught us to pray – Many times in the New Testament we see where Jesus went to be alone and talk to the Father. **So prayer is talking with, listening to, communicating with the Father**

Prayer is *not* a one-way conversation – it is talking *and* listening

How do we listen? Every time before reading a passage of scripture, pray for God to speak to you through the passage you are about to read. **God speaks through His Word!**

This is not so much to change God but to bring us in line with what God would have us to be like and what He would have us do.

The Bible teaches us that we are to pray continually, I Thessalonians 5:16-18, ¹⁶Be joyful always; ¹⁷**pray continually**; ¹⁸give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.

I often go on prayer walks or runs – just me and the Lord. If I am driving by myself, I don't typically listen to the radio, but I pray. When I am sitting in meetings, I am in an attitude of prayer.

Prayer is about communication – say what you mean and mean what you say – you are not to pray for others to hear and be impressed with what you have to say.

The Message – “The world is full of so-called prayer warriors who are prayer-ignorant. They're full of formulas and programs and advice, peddling techniques for getting what you want from God. Don't fall for that nonsense. This is your Father you are dealing with, and he knows better than you what you need. With a God like this loving you, you can pray very simply.”

Conclusion – Jesus taught us we should pray; Jesus is our example. I Thessalonians tells us to pray continually. The words you use are not important, the communication is! Remember that God is Holy, He is our Father, not just another person. Pray for God's will; that tells me we should search Scripture to find what His will is. Ask God to meet our daily needs – No barn building, Ask for and give forgiveness.

The ACTS way of prayer:

A – Adoration, C – Confession, T – Thanksgiving, S – Supplication (praying for your needs and the needs of others)

Lord, teach us to pray. Amen.

Persecution May Come

“Persecution came, but they witnessed. They were stoned, but they witnessed. They were beaten, but they witnessed. They were imprisoned, but they witnessed.” (*Prophetic Evangelist: The Living Legacy of Harry Denman*, 1993)

To describe the courage and commitment of local volunteer firefighters, Jess Eagle subtitled an article he wrote, “While everyone else is running out, they’re still running in.” This bold claim marked the men and women on the crew as genuine heroes who placed their lives on the line for the sake of others. It was not about pride or professionalism. It was not about fame or amassing wealth. It was not even about some theory of life or philosophical approach. It was about knowing that there were people who needed saving and reaching them in time.

That is the basis of Christian evangelism. When we are actually convinced that our mortal house is on fire, we will do what we must to rescue those who are still in danger. They are, after all, our own family. We are one people.

As long as we are comfortable that all paths lead home, we will stand in our comfort zones and enjoy our personal religious experiences. If we can convince ourselves that the warnings of judgment are metaphorical, we can preach when it is convenient, witness when our words are well received, and hold our peace the rest of the time. But when we squarely confront the clear message of the Gospel that Christ is the solitary way to eternal life, our apathy evaporates, and we reinterpret the crowd’s resistance as cries for help.

If we suffer, we suffer. If it costs us, we will pay. There are people perishing. Let us rescue them, even if we fall along the way.

Acts 5:17-20 (Contemporary English Version)

“The high priest and all the other Sadducees who were with him became jealous. They arrested the apostles and put them in the city jail. But that night an angel from the Lord opened the doors of the jail and led the apostles out. The angel said, ‘Go to the temple and tell the people everything about this new life.’”

Evangelize the Evangelist

“Our supreme task will be to ‘Evangelize the Evangelist.’ We must give ourselves to evangelizing the membership of the local church. Our church members need an experience of Christ until they have a concern for every un-churched person in the community. Evangelism must not be a special effort in the local church, but it must become the main business of each church member.”

(Prophetic Evangelist: The Living Legacy of Harry Denman, 1993)

All it would take to evangelize the world in a generation would be to awaken the Church of the Twenty-first Century to the mindset of the First Century Church. In those beginning days, the followers of the Lord understood the concept of telling the story. They recognized that the mission belonged to each of them. They were not specialized or secularized. They had not mastered the fine art of hiring someone to do their witnessing for them.

We need to regain our passion. We need to hear the call again. It is not the call to ordained ministry that most effectively moves the Church forward, though we recognize that call as beautiful and essential. The call we need to hear again is the individual believer’s call to be filled with the Spirit of God to the extent that witnessing becomes natural.

Acts 1:8 does not say that when the Holy Spirit comes upon us we will be given power to witness. It says that we will be given power *and* that we will be witnesses. There is a subtle difference there, but it is a vital one. Witnessing is not what we do. A witness is who we become. It is not a job, a task or a hobby. It is personal transformation.

Imagine how the world would change if every believer engaged all the resources at their disposal to the communication of the Gospel. If we moved far beyond “giving so that others could go” to the use of every computer, cell phone, page of print, and social venue legally available to us for the purpose of the living out of the Gospel of Life. How long would it be before the last people group was reached?

Acts 1:8 (New Living Translation)

Who ministers? Well, the Bishop appoints a pastor [or pastors]. There is a worship committee and a choir. There are worship leaders, liturgists, and acolytes. There are many ministers with highly defined roles. But that is still a very small part of the answer.

Christ ministers to God’s Church through the many members of the body of Christ. That would be you and me. That would be each of us living into the work God is doing in and through us. That would be all of us respecting and attending to each of us.

Ministering to the Church is not about going into the church building to participate in an orderly service of worship. It is about being an active part of a community of believers dedicated to refining one another’s witness to the world. To reach the world with the Gospel, we help each other go on toward perfection in love.

1 Corinthians 12:7, 29-31a

A spiritual gift is given to each of us so we can help each other ... Are we all apostles? Are we all prophets? Are we all teachers? Do we all have the power to do miracles? Do we all have the gift of healing? Do we all have the ability to speak in unknown languages? Do we all have the ability to interpret unknown languages? Of course not! So you should earnestly desire the most helpful gifts.

Jesus Identified Himself with People

“Christ’s gospel for all humankind does not see a Samaritan or a woman but sees a person who is trying to satisfy the things of the flesh.”

The world is full of barriers. We are grouped, categorized, and subdivided everywhere we go. From our early years, we learn to identify ourselves by comparing ourselves to others. Birth order at home, grade level at school, and level of competency in the workplace become part of our understanding of who we are. If, as adults, we are asked to describe ourselves to others we would most likely lead off with a recitation of our gender, marital status, race and occupation. We establish identity through separation.

But in Christ we are identified through unity. When we meet the Lord, we are embraced into a fellowship that transcends our individual differences. It no longer matters whether we are male or female, what color our skin happens to be, or on which side of the tracks – or the world – we were born. We are born anew as members of one holy and universal body. Each of us is of sacred worth to all of us.

Becoming one in the body of Christ does not mean losing our identities or resigning the things that make us unique. Our individual gifts are not surrendered to the whole, but are employed in making the whole body stronger and more agile in outreach to the world.

In Galatians 3:28 (New Living Translation) we read, “There is no longer Jew or Gentile, slave or free, male and female. For you are all one in Christ Jesus.”

This is the way we perceive each other in the Church. This is the way Jesus has seen us from the beginning.

What if we saw the people beyond our walls that way all the time? What if we reached past every barrier with welcoming words and works? What if we all chose to look at the world through eyes of perfect love?

“Soon a Samaritan woman came to draw water, and Jesus said to her, ‘Please give me a drink.’ ... The woman was surprised, for Jews refuse to have anything to do with Samaritans. Day 25 – March 18, 2010

“Jesus was full of witnessing grace. He had a concern for the unconcerned. He sought the unsought. He loved the unlovely. He desired the undesirable. He was gracious to the ungracious. He wanted the unwanted.” (*Prophetic Evangelist: The Living Legacy of Harry Denman*, 1993)

Years ago I was a part of a congregation that received a designated gift in the offering plate. A small envelope filled with cash held a note directing the church leaders to arrange transportation to Sunday school for the unchurched children in our local government housing projects. The money was enough to get our church bus repaired, tagged, and on the road. The trip across town would effectively double our complement of children.

At that time I was serving as the intermediate Sunday school teacher, and I was delighted at the prospect of welcoming the new children; but one of our teachers was not as open to the idea. He worked with little boys, and he was highly upset with the idea of mixing “that sort” of children with our well-behaved, orderly boys. I remember being shocked and highly disappointed with this gentleman who had always seemed to have the church’s best interests at heart. It would be years before I would discover the root of my friend’s problem. He had never made the leap from working to build his congregation to working at building the Kingdom of God.

The gentleman’s reasons were sound. Having the disruptive boys in the room with his well-behaved group would create trouble. Discipline would be difficult with boys who had no parents present to reinforce the authority of the teachers, and the group we were extending ourselves to draw in had nothing obvious to offer to the church.

In the short-term, having the exuberant and untrained children and youth in the mix created a host of problems. Things got broken. Things went missing. There were difficult moments between children and uncomfortable confrontations with workers. But we persisted in ministry to these “undesirables” and watched for the miracle of transformation to take hold.

And take hold it did! From that group we watched three ministers rise. Another half-dozen young people became productive members of the little congregation. And the resistant teacher is among their most ardent advocates.

I have often wondered whether the anonymous donor had seen these children through the Lord’s eyes. Did that generous soul borrow Heaven’s perspective? Or was it just an act of obedience to drop that money in the plate without knowing why God had asked for the sacrifice? Either way, it was just like Jesus to look past the visible. Faith sees the unseen.

The Universal Gospel

“Universal means all persons. A church that witnesses only to those who come to its sanctuary will soon be a museum or a mausoleum. The church that believes in the gospel of Christ will go to the community in which the church is located.” (*Prophetic Evangelist: The Living Legacy of Harry Denman*, 1993)

When the disciples followed Jesus through Samaria on the way from Judea to Galilee, their minds were on practical things. So, when noon came, the disciples were thinking about what most of us do at noon. They went looking for food.

Jesus *seemed* to have his mind on practical things as well. He wanted to rest, and he wanted a drink. But why did he choose to sit in this particular place and ask this particular woman to share with him the water she drew? Could it be that the Lord thirsted for something more permanent than a sip of water?

Jesus came to reconcile humankind to God. That was the mission that consumed his mind on the way to Galilee that early afternoon. And when a social outcast came to draw water at midday, the Lord was there to draft her into the mission of the Kingdom.

Why her? Because a woman who has so much to regret needs to know that someone who knows her whole story still believes in her worth. And when a woman with so much to regret feels the transforming power of forgiveness, her love for her redeemer is profound. That love will cause her to intentionally seek out and witness to the folk she hid from in shame before her transformation.

Living faith seeks to be shared. Congregations that actively share their faith in the community are drawing on rich spiritual nourishment. Those that do not are flirting with spiritual starvation and will forfeit congregational growth.

Jesus has done the first work. Generations of the faithful have carried the mission forward. But the harvest is incomplete. The Lord’s message to our generation is the same as the one he spoke to those first disciples. “Wake up and look around!” Let’s go out of our way to find the sinners outside our walls.

John 4:34-35 (New Living Translation)

Then Jesus explained: “My nourishment comes from doing the will of God, who sent me, and from finishing his work. You know the saying, ‘Four months between planting and harvest.’ But I say, wake up and look around. The fields are already ripe for harvest.”

By global measures, we are rich. Our resources are considerable, and when we hear of disasters or difficulties in our communities, we have systems in place to respond in tangible ways. Even with our recent economic downturn, we are generous and extremely responsive. That is something we should celebrate. But offering monetary or physical assistance will never be enough to justify our claiming the label *Church*. The Church is the body of Christ on Earth, and whatever else we offer to the world, we must offer Christ in reality and power.

When each of us, clergy and laity alike, is devoted to *following and sharing* Jesus, our approach to evangelism will be about far more than eradicating poverty and alleviating suffering. It will never be enough for us to rescue people from their earthly oppressors. There is a deeper oppression that only Christ’s power can break.

Only when we introduce Christ into the lives of others will their lives cease to stumble along. It is in his name that the lame of the world actually rise up and walk.

Acts 3:6 (New Living Translation)

But Peter said, “I don't have any silver or gold for you. But I'll give you what I have. In the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene, get up and walk!”

Every Person Is Valuable

“The universal gospel teaches that a person is valuable because God loves him or her. We are more than material; we are spiritual. We are created in the image of God.” (*Prophetic Evangelist: The Living Legacy of Harry Denman*, 1993)

How do we assign value to the human soul? Is one life worth more than another because of differences in geography, intellect, or material assets? Does experience, education, or skill enhance one’s worth? Does sin diminish it?

If we want to know the value of something – or someone – the key is to ask a collector. The price a collector is willing to pay is the best measure of value. Gold is a metal, and diamonds are rocks. Their worth is dependent on the amount people currently are willing to pay to obtain them.

So, who collects human souls?

For love of humankind, God freely gave the greatest wealth of Heaven. Entering into the suffering of our fallen state, God took on our whole debt and paid the highest price imaginable to redeem us from death. In so doing, God set the price because God is the only collector of human souls. (The only other bid on the market is from a destroyer.) The price God has set for the soul is the life Jesus Christ, God’s only Son. The worth of that life is inestimable – indeed, it is infinite.

When we shop for collectables, we trade in grades of goods. Some are in excellent condition. Some are restored. Some are damaged, and many are broken beyond repair. We pay far less for the less-than-perfect. We say they have lost their value through poor treatment or mishandling. But God paid one price for all, and that is the only measure we can rightly use to assign worth to any person.

What is the value of a human soul? A person’s worth is beyond measure because we are each so deeply loved by God.

John 3:16-17 (New Living Translation)

“For God loved the world so much that he gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life. God sent his Son into the world not to judge the world, but to save the world through him.”

From the streets of middle Tennessee to the heart of Beijing, from the highest rung on the corporate ladder of Wall Street to the deepest poverty pocket in the Third World, from the desk in the Oval Office to the last bunk in the cells of Guantanamo Bay, the offer was made to all.

This universal call has gone out for two millennia and will echo in the faithful witness of every true believer until every tribe, tongue, and nation has heard. If we believe, we will tell our world. If we are not telling, it is because we do not truly believe. James told us that “...faith without works is dead.” (James 2:20) If we are not actively fulfilling our mission as a Church, our faith is at least anemic and may have passed away.

God so loved that he gave. If we believe in the love of God, we, too, will give. We will give more than our money, and more than our time. We will give ourselves, heart and soul, to the mission. We will give our voices and our behavior to the expression of the Gospel for the sake of the one who loves us all. No lesser answer to divine love will suffice.

This young man had a look that would cause some to look at him and walk the other way. He had tattoos and piercings, and he tended to wear clothing that made a bold statement about his life. This young man was one who in reality was wearing his pain on the outside as much as he was living his pain on the inside. At an early age, this young man lost his dad to suicide and for the next 22 years had to ask himself why. He grew up in a world that wasn’t very understanding of the pain he felt and for the most part, no one took the time to try and understand the pain in which he lived.

We have a responsibility to reach out to the people around us who do not look, dress, or smell like we do. We live in a world that is riddled with pain and suffering, and in this country much of that pain is emotional and not physical. Where do these folks go to find hope if not to us?

Look around you today; speak to that one you usually avoid. Take time to listen to who they are and what they have to say. And if you don’t know anyone like that, find someone. It’s not very difficult; just go to the local mall, to Wal Mart, or to any public setting, and you are sure to find her or him.

Tell your story, the story of how God came into your heart and changed you from the inside out. When people see a changed life, they will come because of your satisfaction in Jesus Christ.

“I remember being so impressed to learn that most of his worldly possessions consisted of what he was wearing on his back! He had no need for material gifts.” (*Prophetic Evangelist: The Living Legacy of Harry Denman*, 1993) Kitty Mann

I was honored with the Denman Evangelism Award in 2004 by The Holston Annual Conference. When I received the award, I wanted to get my hands on everything I could find that Harry Denman had done. I was able to acquire the book *Prophetic Evangelist* from The Foundation for Evangelism. Here are a few pieces of information from the book about the ministry and simplicity of Harry Denman.

“He was an ecclesiastical statesman. His spiritual vision was always bifocal. He was at his best when telling the story of Jesus and salvation to an individual, something he managed to do every day of his mature life. Yet he always kept in mind and heart the needs and opportunities of the whole church in its wider mission. Harry Denman’s vision grew out of his conviction that it was possible, in God’s time, for the whole world to turn to our Lord. He believed that his job was to do what he could to bring that about, one person at a time.”

When Denman died, “Closing his estate was no big task, for he gave all his material possessions away throughout his life.”

“He preached to large crowds in churches, auditoriums, stadiums, and camp meetings, but he would pour out his heart and soul with equal fervor to the few gathered in a remote village or at a storefront church.” He copied the entire Bible in handwriting at least once in his lifetime. He said this discipline led him to new insights into the scriptures. Harry arose about 12:30 a.m. each morning, studied the scriptures by copying them, and prayed during the night. Harry Denman had a view of evangelism that was anything but narrow. “He set the churches on fire, and we had the greatest years in evangelism in the history of modern Methodism.”

“I remember being so impressed to learn that most of his worldly possessions consisted of what he was wearing on his back! He had no need for material gifts.”

I am honored to be a recipient of the Denman Evangelism Award, and I am again honored to be involved in challenging the people of Holston Conference to live simple lives and have nothing more important than telling others about Jesus Christ.

He never owned a watch. He had only one suit at a time. He carries his toiletries in a paper bag in his one briefcase to save space in packing.

Prayer

Lord, help us to live simple lives, to not be weighed down with the things of the world. Help us to follow Harry Denman in the simple way, but even more, help us to follow Christ. Amen.

We live in a time where people seldom fight over Blue Laws anymore, and if you have no idea what a Blue Law is, then you fit the category I am speaking of.

People have responsibilities like no other time in history. There are more people employed in jobs where they have to work on Sunday morning at 11 a.m. Law Enforcement, Hospitals, Convenience Stores, Hotels, Restaurants, etc. These things are realities, and we need to provide worship for those who do not have a typical 9:00-5:00 job.

We don't find prescribed meeting times in the Bible, only a prescription to meet together.

Prayer: Father, help us to step outside the boxes we have placed ourselves in. These are not boxes that you put together and said we must stay here. Lord, help us to think outside the box, then step outside the box, in faith. Amen.

In Jerusalem after he drove the money changers from the Temple porch, the lame, halt, and blind came for healing. The church too has a ministry to outcasts.

After Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness fasting, he was determined to live according to the will of God. He was going to worship and serve God only. The early Christians voluntarily shared a common life. Those with resources shared with the had-nots. No one was in need. The fellowship was enriched at the table. One hundred and twenty followers of Jesus prayed for ten days and were baptized with the Holy Spirit. The new fellowship became a force. They were persecuted, but their numbers grew. On the day of Pentecost Peter told his hearers about Jesus. They asked, “What shall we do?” He replied, “Repent and be baptized ... for the forgiveness of your sins” (Acts 2:37-38), and some 3,000 were added to their number that day.

Our Father, may we accept the obligations of disciplined living as the means by which we obtain fullness of life. Help us to resist the temptation of living only the pleasures or for thrills that have no lasting worth or value. Amen.

And he arose and went: and, behold, a man of Ethiopia, a eunuch of great authority under Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, who had the charge of all her treasure, and had come to Jerusalem for to worship, was returning, and sitting in his chariot read Esaias the prophet. Then the Spirit said unto Phillip, ‘Go near, and join thyself to this chariot.’ And Phillip ran thither to him.” Phillip ran.

He ran because the errand was urgent. The opportunity to bear the gospel witness to the Ethiopian would not come again, and God had no one else to run this errand. He ran because he was under orders of the Holy Spirit. There was no higher authority for him to submit to than that.

Day 40 – April 02, 2010

Mommy, I'm so thirsty. I want a drink.

Susanna Petroysan heard her daughter's pleas, but there was nothing she could do. She and four-year-old Gayaney were trapped beneath tons of collapsed concrete and steel. Beside them in the darkness lay the body of Susanna's sister-in-law, Karine, one of the 55,000 victims of the worst earthquake in the history of Soviet Armenia.

Susanna had gone to Karine's house to try on a dress. It was December 7, 1988, at 11:30 a.m. The quake hit at 11:41. She had just removed the dress and was clad in stockings and a slip when the fifth-floor apartment began to shake. Susanna grabbed her daughter but had taken only a few steps before the floor opened up and they tumbled in. Susanna, Gayaney, and Karine fell into the basement with the nine-story apartment house crumbling around them.

Mommy, I need a drink. Please give me something.

There was nothing for Susanna to give. She was trapped flat on her back. A concrete panel eighteen inches above her head and a crumpled water pipe above her shoulders kept her from standing. Feeling around in the darkness, she found a twenty-four ounce jar of blackberry jam that had fallen into the basement. She gave the entire jar to her daughter to eat. It was gone by the second day.

Mommy, I'm so thirsty.

Susanna knew she would die, but she wanted her daughter to live. She found a dress, perhaps the one she had come to try on, and made a bed for Gayaney. Though it was bitter cold, she took off her stockings and wrapped them around the child to keep her warm. The two were trapped for eight days. Because of the darkness, Susanna lost track of time. Because of the cold, she lost the feeling in her fingers and toes. Because of her inability to move, she lost hope. "I was just waiting for death."

She began to hallucinate. Her thoughts wandered. A merciful sleep occasionally freed her from the horror of her entombment, but the sleep would be brief. Something always awakened her: the cold, the hunger, or most often, the voice of her daughter.

Mommy, I'm thirsty.

At some point in that eternal night, Susanna had an idea. She remembered a television program about an explorer in the Arctic who was dying of thirst. His comrade slashed open his hand and gave his friend his blood. "I had no water, no fruit juice, no liquids. It was then I remembered I had my own blood." Her groping finger, numb from the cold, found a piece of shattered glass. She sliced open her left index finger and gave it to her daughter to suck. The drops of blood weren't enough. "Please, Mommy, some more. Cut another finger." Susanna has no idea how many times she cut herself. She only knows that if she hadn't, Gayaney would have died. Her blood was her daughter's only hope.

Prayer: Father, just like this story, it is Jesus' blood that gives us life. We live in a world of thirsty souls, looking for the water of life. You offer that life through your son Jesus Christ. Help us, your sons and daughters, to offer that life to those who thirst.

4. Acts of kindness with a card that reads, “Serving because of Jesus.” List the name, address, and contact information of your church. Give directions and worship times.
Examples of acts of kindness:
 - Wash windshields @ WalMart or the local grocery store – You may be able to work with a local gas station to wash windshields for their customers.
 - Soft drink giveaways at sporting events where concessions are not available.
 - Trash pick-up in your community
5. Pens, pencils, and Post-it® notes giveaway
6. Mothers Day carnation giveaway
7. Oil changes for single parents
8. Door-to-door free Sunday paper and coffee with information about your church
9. Tutoring at your church for local students, free of charge, and provide a snack or meal for those who might not have enough to eat at home
10. Clothing giveaway in your community, advertise “Come Take What You Need”
11. Offer parenting classes
12. Offer financial planning classes
13. Hold 5th Quarter gatherings with free food and sodas after football and basketball games
14. Hold Extra Innings after baseball games
15. Hold Block Party for Youth with free food, Wii, videos, etc.
16. Make prayer walks through neighborhoods, praying for each household
17. Make a Top 10 List of the people you want God to reach and start praying for those persons
18. Host a community event such as Team Impact or The Power Team
